od gave laws to His people to guide them to live for Him and to help them be holy. By giving these laws, God was not making it hard for people.

Instead, He was trying to show them a right, good, and healthy way to live in the land He would give them. His laws would protect them from wrong and sinful things and guide them to be holy as He is holy.

Laws about Clean and Unclean

God gave laws to His people so they would know the difference between what was clean and unclean. The laws explained which

animals were clean and could be used for food and which animals were unclean and should not be eaten. The laws also explained some conditions of the body that were clean and others that were unclean. Clean food and conditions helped people be holy and able to come close to God.

Israel's priests were to teach people the laws about what was clean and unclean and help them obey the laws.

People lived in the world where there were many unclean things and conditions. God's laws helped people live so they could come close to a holy God to worship and serve Him. The laws reminded people of how far they were from God and that God helps people come near and be right with Him.

It was not sin to be unclean. But when a person became unclean, he or she needed to take the right actions to be clean again. A person put himself in danger if he tried to come close to God while he was unclean. The people of Israel were to learn the difference between things that were clean and unclean so they could be set apart to be God's people—to be holy as God is holy.

Laws about Blood

Sin separates people from God. This separation from God is a kind of death. God told people that sin results in death. Remember that God told Adam and Eve not to eat of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. He said if you eat of this tree "you will surely die." Adam and Eve ate the fruit of the tree and separated themselves

from God. They brought a kind of death to themselves, as all people do by their sin.

But God is kind and loving, and He helps people with sin. He gave Israel sacrifices so people's sins could be forgiven. The sacrifices were usually animals that were killed so that blood no longer flowed in their bodies. God explained that blood is what makes people live. When an animal was given as a sacrifice, it was killed so that its blood came out. This blood was to be respected and used in a careful way. God said that the animal's death would stand for

In teaching people how to treat others, God kept reminding them of who He is. What four words about Himself did God repeat several times? the sinner's death and would provide forgiveness. Now, God provides forgiveness through Jesus' blood—because He died for sins.

Other Laws

God gave many other laws to Israel to guide them in what was right and good, and to keep them from what was wrong and bad. He knew His people would have many temptations in their new land. The people who lived in the land before them worshiped idols and did many other wrong things.

God knew His people would be tempted to do these bad things, so He gave laws to guide them. God said, "Thus you are to keep My charge, that you do not practice any of the abominable customs which have been practiced before you, so as not to defile yourselves with them; I am the Lord your God."

God also gave laws that taught people how to treat each other. His people were to be kind, good, and fair toward others. God said, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself; I am the Lord." Many years later, Jesus called this command the second greatest commandment. God guided His people to live good, clean, right, and holy lives so they would be His people and would enjoy His great and rich blessings.
